

He talked about the flourishing Medieval Market held each Wednesday in Watton and comprised of over 60 stalls held in the area around Middle Street, branching off in all directions and all in sight of The Manor House. He encouraged us to look up for historical signs the next time we walk down the High Street as the first floor upwards of the shops have not changed that much over the centuries, apart from many less chimney stacks. Julian was thanked for the very interesting evening by Rosemary. He very kindly donated his fee to the Heritage Lottery Fund at St John's Church.


The competition for the letter 'N' was won by Joyce with her quaint Nut Crackers.

Wacky Scrappy Gravity Race

A fun competition on Spring bank holiday:

Monday 30 May 2016

You must make a cart that you can sit in or on. It must not have any form of motive power, engine, pedals, sail, etc.

The competition is the sum of two parts:

1. Judges will award points for design, original ideas and imaginative use of scrap material; points will be deducted for use of new stuff (except safety material).
2. Timed runs will be made, with the quickest cart earning most points. The race will commence from a fixed sloping platform giving each cart a consistent 'push-off', then it is just the road incline to keep you going!

Your cart will need to get under a 1m high bridge, negotiate at least one chicane, before taking on the infamous 'allotment corner' and then it is a high speed 'amble' to the finish line outside the village hall. We might think up some other devious obstacles before event day, so make sure you have good control.

Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) Public Meeting

A report of the St John's Heritage Lottery Fund Public meeting held on Friday 22 Jan.

Our Community – Our Church

The progress made with the heritage lottery fund (HLF) to repair, restore and reinvigorate the church as a community asset were well received by a large group. The project is in two specific but linked parts.

Part one, the church restoration work, was presented by the architect who described how the Quinquennial Inspection report in 2009 showed significant repairs were needed and HLF monies have been allocated as a result. The report identified that severe drainage problems were causing damage to the fabric of the church and tower. Discussion took place about linked proposals to modify the inside of the church to increase opportunities for community access such as perhaps moving the font, two rows of pews and improving the limited kitchen facilities. These, plus the suggestion of having a toilet in the church, sparked a lively debate. The architect advised that plans for various designs would be available for public consideration and it was agreed to take concerns to a future meeting with the PCC. It was acknowledged that there needed to be village involvement and transparency about what was happening.

Part two is the Community Project and this was well received with representatives of some of the participating schools in attendance. Sali Martin, Head of Vocational Studies at Wayland Academy has two groups of Year 10 students who are very keen to be involved providing physical assistance in helping to restore the graveyard and working with the architect on exam based projects. Andrew Evans, an A level student from the Icen Academy, demonstrated the HLF church website that he and a fellow student Luke Heys have constructed from scratch. They have provided the website structure which will facilitate a discussion forum and news feed to allow us to contribute and monitor the progress of the project. Their hard work, over a short time, was recognised by all.

The overall project was enthusiastically received. Further meetings will be held to clarify the points already raised and to address boundary and access queries. This will allow the HLF application to progress and release further money.

Thank you all for coming. We hope to have a further open meeting early in March. The Oracle will provide regular updates on the project including dates of open meeting, all welcome to attend.

Parish Council (PC)

A report of the meeting on 7 January, from notes and the unconfirmed minutes.

Matters Arising from previous minutes

The PC discussed the Gravity Race (see page 5), a number of matters associated with this were delegated to Cllr Birt in association with the Clerk.

The *Parish Partnership Bid* for bus stops on the main road was submitted and acknowledged. The result will be known in April / May.

The dog bin has been re-installed centrally on a new post, however, a review of Land Registry appears to show that the initial installation location was on public land after all. Other dog bins in the village are showing signs of rusting and the cost of replacements will be added to the next budget.

PC audit requirements are changing. Councillors agreed to use the the Norfolk Association of Local Councils (NALC) expertise to comply with our legal requirements.

A tree survey within Ovington Glebe is expected to be completed early in 2016. The PC awaits the Glebe surveyor's report.

Planning

Alston Farm – Convert barn to dwelling (3PL/2015/1374/F):
Councillors felt that the application should be refused as it would relinquish planning control of vehicle movements on to a dangerous stretch of road. Councillors noted that this is losing an employment opportunity within the area and that there are no services, footway, buses or local facilities to make this a sustainable change of use.

Otterwood Kennel – An appeal is under way, the Clerk will inform the Council of the outcome in due course.

Proposed 50mph speed limit for A1075.

There are signs already recommending 20mph and 30mph which highlight that a speed limit of 50 mph is too high. The revised northern extent of the 50 mph ends just before the HGV entrance to Barton Farm, councillors felt it more appropriate to include Barton Farm entrance and that the 50mph should cover the side

roads of Saham Road, The Street and Church Road omitted and unclear on the NCC provided documentation. Including these roads would significantly reduce the signage and 'street furniture' requirements.

Finance

Councillors reviewed payments to be made and signed cheques.

It was noted that hire charges for the Village Hall have risen.

Precept for 2016/17

The Clerk circulated a spreadsheet with draft figures for the precept which was discussed. It was agreed that the precept should be increased by 2% for each band D payment. The total therefore requested is £4025.

Administration

The PC agreed to sign an access document (to the allotments) which replaces a temporary agreement which had expired.

Cllr Rumsby has inspected the trees and reported that the cherry tree in Crown Crescent has recovered and the other trees are all in good condition.

Public Participation

A member of the public has mentioned that the trod is not suitable for motorised disability scooters. Councillors agreed but noted that the trod had only ever been described as 'a loose-finished footpath'.

County Councillor (CC) Bowles introduced herself and agreed to support the Parish Council comments regarding the speed limit changes.

District Councillor (DC) Rogers informed the Council that the new Local Plan will be posted to Clerks. The consultation is due to expire before the next meeting. It was agreed that it needs to be circulated and if another meeting is needed to make comments it will be arranged. He added that Watton are looking to reduce the speed limit as it leaves Watton and should link with the Ovington plans. CC Bowles agreed to report this to Highways.

Total rainfall for 2015 was 623.5mm or 24.5" of which December contributed 49.5mm or around 2".

The amount deposited on the village this month so far has been 45mm or 1.8", and it's raining as I write.

The little layer of snow on the 14th contributed, after melting, about 2mm of that total.
